Reflecting on DEI: Accommodating Diverse Needs and Including Diverse Voices

Learning Aids, Resources, Liquid Syllabi, Inclusive Readings, Audio, and Images

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According to *Guide to Digital Accessibility*, "approximately 8.5% of the general population of the U.S. has a disability affecting their computer and Internet use."

Further, "around 19% of undergraduate students have a disability."

The National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) data shows that Philadelphia public school students' scores in reading and math declined over the COVID-19 pandemic (2019 data compared to 2021 data).

Further, the Journal of Medical Internet Research finds that some 71% of surveyed college students have reported "increased stress, anxiety, and depressive thoughts" due to the COVID-19 outbreak—reporting "difficulty in concentrating" and "decreased social interactions due to physical distancing."

Faculty members can help students develop strategies to be successful by using planning aids, providing resources, accommodating different learning styles, making materials accessible, and including diverse voices. For example, Executive Functioning Skills (Planning, Organization, Task Initiation, Time Management, Working Memory, Metacognition, Self-Control, Attention/Focus, Flexibility, and Perseverance) can be improved by encouraging and/or providing various planning aids to students.









Beauty is a Verb: The New Poetry of Disability





The Right Way to be Crippled & Naked: The Fiction of Disability






Doing Time: 25 Years of Prison Writing
